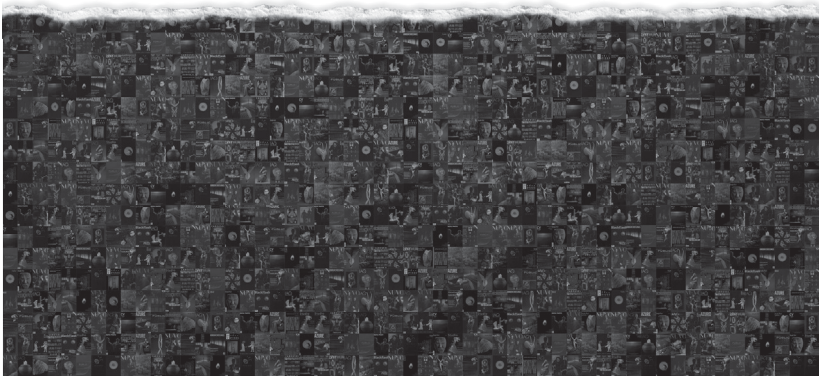

## South Asian Canadian Literature: A Centennial Journey

*Studies in Canadian Literature / Études en littérature canadienne*, published at the University of New Brunswick since 1975, invites submissions to a special issue focusing on South Asian Canadian literature, to be edited by Mariam Pirbhai, Cynthia Sugars, and Herb Wylie.

May 23, 2014, marks the centennial anniversary of the “*Komagata Maru* Incident,” which involved the arrival and subsequent expulsion of hopeful South Asian migrants looking to join a modest South Asian community already settled in the Dominion since the turn of the century. This Special Issue looks to the *Komagata Maru* as the symbolic marker of South Asian Canadian migration history as a “one hundred year” phenomenon. We invite submissions on all topics related to South Asian Canadian literature and culture, in terms that are as expansive, varied, and richly textured as the “centennial” history of South Asian Canadian settlement might imply. We welcome papers that examine under-represented genres; new critical, theoretical, comparative, or interdisciplinary approaches to works by canonical or emerging authors; and contributions that help broaden our understanding of the texts, contexts, innovations, and hermeneutics of South Asian Canadian writers.



Possible topics include:

- narrativizations of the *Komagata Maru*
- second-generation writers/perspectives
- food, memory, belonging
- globalization, neoliberalism and South Asian “capital”
- transnational, cross-cultural or hemispheric frameworks
- diasporic cartographies (e.g., Indo-Caribbean, the “double diaspora”)
- conflict and crisis: the Sri Lankan Civil War; Kashmir; 9/11; Pakistan-U.S. relations; “war on terror”
- theater/performance collectives: e.g., Montreal Serai, Vancouver Sath, Why Not Theatre, Teesri Duniya Theatre
- critical studies or surveys of under-represented genres: e.g., drama, poetry, the short story, memoir or life writing, children’s/young adult literature, the graphic novel

Contributors are encouraged to propose papers focusing on canonical and/or lesser known authors. Examples include (but are certainly not restricted to) Sadhu Binning, Rana Bose, Randy Boyagoda, Cyril Dabydeen, Ranj Dhaliwal, Farzana Doctor, Rishma Dunlop, Anosh Irani, Surjeet Kalsey, Rohinton Mistry, Shani Mootoo, Michael Ondaatje, Anita Rau Badami, Ajmer Rode, Shyam Selvadurai, Priscila Uppal, M.G. Vassanji.

We welcome submissions in English and in French. Submissions should be 6,000-8,000 words, including Notes and Works Cited, and should conform to the *MLA Handbook*, 7th edition or *Le guide du rédacteur*, 2nd edition. Please submit essays electronically via Word attachment to scl@unb.ca.

## Appel d'articles

# La littérature canadienne du Sud asiatique : un périple centenaire

Publiée à l'Université du Nouveau-Brunswick depuis 1975, la revue *Studies in Canadian Literature / Études en littérature canadienne* vous invite à soumettre un article pour un numéro spécial portant sur la littérature canadienne du Sud asiatique. Ce dossier sera dirigé par Mariam Pirbhai, Cynthia Sugars et Herb Wylie.

Le 23 mai 2014 marque le centième anniversaire de l'incident du *Komagata Maru*, provoqué par l'arrivée et l'expulsion subséquente de migrants pleins d'espoir venus de l'Asie du Sud en vue de se joindre à une modeste communauté sud-asiatique déjà établie dans le Dominion depuis le début du siècle. Ce numéro spécial considère le *Komagata Maru* comme le repère symbolique qui jalonne l'histoire de l'immigration sud-asiatique au Canada en tant que phénomène centenaire. Les directeurs du numéro invitent les textes traitant de tout sujet lié à la littérature et à la culture des Canadiens d'origine sud-asiatique dans toute l'étendue, la variété et la richesse que peut supposer l'histoire « centenaire » de l'établissement de Sud-Asiatiques au Canada. Les directeurs du numéro souhaitent recevoir des textes qui examinent des genres sous-représentés; de nouvelles approches critiques, théoriques, comparatives ou multidisciplinaires d'œuvres d'auteurs reconnus ou émergents; et des articles qui contribuent à élargir notre compréhension des textes, des contextes, des innovations et de l'herméneutique des écrivains canadiens d'origine sud-asiatique.



**Parmi les pistes de réflexion possibles, on notera, à titre indicatif, les suivantes :**

- les narrativisations de l'incident du *Komagata Maru*
- les écrivains/perspectives de la deuxième génération
- la nourriture, la mémoire, l'appartenance
- la mondialisation, le néolibéralisme et le « capital » sud-asiatique
- les cadres transnational, interculturel ou hémisphérique
- la cartographie des diasporas (p. ex., indo-caribéenne, la « double diaspora »)
- conflit et crise : la guerre civile au Sri Lanka, le Cachemire, le 11 septembre, les relations pakistano-américaines, la « guerre au terrorisme »
- les collectifs de théâtre ou de performance : p. ex., Montreal Serai, Vancouver Sath, Why Not Theatre, Teesri Duniya Theatre
- les études critiques ou les vues d'ensemble de genres sous-représentés : p. ex., le théâtre, la poésie, la nouvelle, les mémoires ou récits de vie, la littérature pour enfants/jeunes adultes, le roman illustré

Les personnes intéressées sont encouragées à soumettre un article s'intéressant à des auteurs reconnus et/ou moins connus. 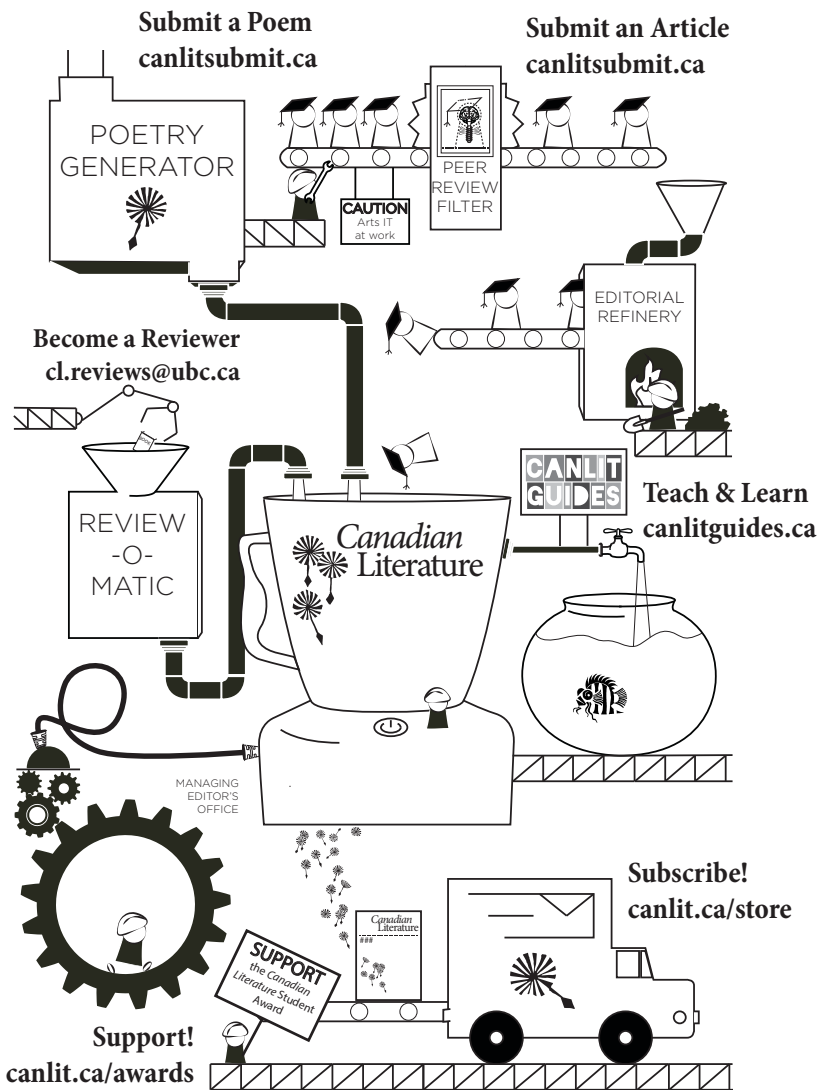

**Entries** must be original and unpublished elsewhere. No simultaneous submissions. All entries must be submitted by mail. No faxed, digital, or emailed submissions are allowed. Word-processed or typed entries only.

**Do not put your name and address** on your manuscript. Include a cover page that has on it the entry's title(s), the category your entry goes in, and your name and contact information.

**Multiple entries** are allowed; however, each entry must be accompanied by its own cover page and entry fee. Manuscripts will not be returned. Please keep a copy of your entry.

**One short-fiction** entry is one story (6,000 words maximum). Short-fiction entries should be double spaced and paginated.

**One poetry** entry is up to 3 poems; no more than 100 lines per poem. Poems may be single spaced. If a poem is longer than one page, please make sure that each page is numbered and has the poem's title on it.

**Entry Fee:** \$30 for an entry from Canada and \$36 for an international entry. The entry fee includes a one-year subscription to *The Fiddlehead*. Already a subscriber? — you'll receive a one-year extension to your current subscription or you can chose to gift a friend.

**Make your cheque/money order** payable to *The Fiddlehead* and enclose it with your entry. International entrants paying by cheque/money order pay in USD. **Only contest winners** will be contacted directly before the end of February 2015 and they will be announced on the *Fiddlehead* website.
