Robert Craig Brown is Professor of History at the University of Toronto. After graduating from the University of Rochester, he took his graduate degrees at Toronto and taught at the University of Calgary. He returned to Toronto in 1964 and later served as Director of Graduate Studies and Associate Chairman of the Department of History. In 1977 he was awarded an Isaac Walton Killam Senior Research Scholarship. He has written numerous historical essays and is a former editor of the *Canadian Historical Review*. He is the co-editor of *Confederation to 1949* and *The Canadians, 1867-1967*, co-author of *Canada Views the United States and Canada, 1896-1921: The Nation Transformed*, and author of *Canada's National Policy, 1885-1900* and a two volume biography of *Robert Laird Borden, 1954-1937*.

Robert Craig Brown est professeur d'histoire à l'université de Toronto. Après avoir fréquenté les universités de Rochester et de Toronto, il enseigna à l'université de Calgary.
