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Global Warming in The Global Village: Humanity's War Against Nature

Although of late, since 1974 I have been working as a media ecologist my previous academic focus was on elementary particle and nuclear physics with my last physics paper published in 1982. With my background in physics and my involvement with Canadian politics I was welcomed in the Pugwash movement. You might say I was a double agent.

Our war against nature, against planet Earth's capacity to sustain us is different than the wars in nature that are waged between a predator and its prey. When the predator kills too many of its prey the population of the prey declines which means there is less food for the predator and so the predator's population declines as well and results in its killing less of its prey and therefore the population of the prey bounces back and increases allowing the predator's population to increase which in turn decreases the prey population and, so on and so forth, the population of the predators and their prey see-saws back and forth and there is always a happy ending to this war in that the war has no ultimate victor and no ultimate loser.

Our war with nature through global warming will have no winners but only losers. We humans will lose and nature will lose. But our loss as humans could be total with the planet not being able to sustain human life while nature's loss will not be total but only partial as many species along with us will be lost. Many species particularly the simpler ones will survive or evolve into species that can live in an atmosphere with the levels of CO2 that we humans created before our demise.
